## UNDERWOOD'S FORMAL OPENING ON SATURDAY

Formal opening of the Underwood ice cream parlor in its new building at 310 North Harrison street, will be held Saturday, May 13. The new white stucco building with its blue shingled roof and bright neon signs adds a great deal to the appearance of the north section of the business district. The interior has been attractively finished in green stain paneling with ivory walls. to the home-like atmosphere exemplifled by the owners, Mr. and Mrs. Leo Underwood, is a large stone fireplace in the south wall at the front of the room, 5/12/39

As for his history, Garwood enrolled in barber school in 1957, the year he married wife Shirley. Robert H. Cunningham gave him his first job in a Washington Street shop between Rusty Sullivan's newspaper office and Vanity Cleaners, where the city parking lot is now.

#### Glove Corporation closes

In February 2011, the Glove Corporation, established in Alexandria in 1922 announced its closure. Reports indicated the closure stemmed from defective fire gloves sold to the New York Fire Department resulting in six firefighters suffering from second degree burns during active fires.



**Buildings** demolished in clean-up, safety effort The look of downtown

Alexandria changed drastically in 2013 with the demolition of several buildings as part of a city wide effort to clean up and rid the city of unsafe structures. Two historical buildings were demolished after being deemed unsafe by Alexandria Building Commissioner, Bob Rogers and city officials.

The historic building, formerly 'Happy Times' bar was demolished in June following an emergency condemnation hearing by the Planning Commission. City officials explored the building in March and went to the Madison County Commissioners for help funding the demolition project. The day long process of the demolition drew crowds to the downtown area to witness history being erased.

Shortly following the demolition of the 'Happy Times' building on Harrison Street, the building next to it met the same fate as what was known as the 'Johnson' building came down in early October. A final effort to save the remaining historic building on the comer of Harrison Street and Church Street, including the former 'Alexandria Bakery' came to an end after potential buyer Eric Freeman determined the cost to purchase and restore the buildings would prove to be too much. 11/15 Bold

THE CITY BUILDING PLAN.

It is apparent that the administration proposes to preced with the proposi-tion to erect a building on the prop-erty at Oburch and Wayne streets, to provide a council chamber and offices. The plans prepared by Architect Mo-Guire and adopted by the council last night are apparently quite complete. They provide for a building 40 by 50 feet, to be built of red pressed brick and Bedford stone, on concrete foundation and with slate roof.

All this promises well. The building sa it is shown on the architect's tracing paper is a splendid and mest desirable thing, and if the plan is successfully and properly carried out it is not the part of this paper to belittle the efforts of the administration to serve the city well-if that were the single purpose of the proceeding. But one is forcibly impressed by the fact that the whole project has been rushed through with a breathless haste and without due deliberation, just at a time when it might be expected to have the greatest weight in the city campaign now waxing warm.

The consideration of the first traciogs of the general plans and elevations and the reading of the spenifications occupied scarcely me re than thirty minutes. No detail drawing was shown and the specifications were passed full of clerical errors in order to rush the thing through and get it done after a fashion. The resolution to accept the plans and receive bids was voted for by men who seriously doubt the city's ability to erect the building and pay for it. But the thing is done now and every fellow will set his teeth and hope for the best. The people have the consoling assurance that when the present officials shall have failed in carrying out the office building project they can turn it over, along with other important matters, into the hands of the men who will be chosen in the mass convection on next Thursday night. That is a most blessed assurance.

The continued session of the city council last night resulted in the final ction for the erection of the proj sity office building. Mr. Frank and Mr. Miller were absent.

City Attorney Jones reported failure to find satisfactory record as to the city's title to a lot on West Broadway, to which it has been proposed to move the dwelling house now standing on the site of the proposed city building at Church and Wayne streets. The matter of location for the house was continued in the hands of the special committee composed of Mr. Frank, Mr. Booth and Mr. Miller.
